## **Voting Delegate 101**

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Competition Season is well underway! Along with the many competitive events hosted at our state and national conferences, TSA also provides opportunities for members to get involved and help lead our organization through elected positions. However, no officer would be where they are today without the support of the members of TSA! As far as elections, this support is channeled through voting delegates who vote on behalf of their chapter. If you have the honor of being selected to represent your chapter as a voting delegate here are some helpful tips:

1. **Listen to your chapter** - Not only are you voting for whom you want but also for whom your chapter favors. Make sure to get a diverse opinion on all the candidates. If your chapter is split on whom to vote for you can hold chapter level elections to decide whom you will cast your ballot for.
2. **Visit all the candidate campaign booths** - It is critical that a voting delegate stays informed on each candidate. Even if you are already leaning towards a particular candidate be sure to listen to all of the candidates equally - what they say may change your opinion.
3. **Ask thoughtful questions** - When talking to candidates, prepare some questions you want to ask to learn more about them such as, "How will you accomplish your goals?" "What inspired you to run for office?" "What makes you the best candidate?" You may want to carry a bag to hold any promotional materials the candidates hand out. Additionally, you may want a paper and pen to take notes about your impressions of each candidate.
4. **Arrive early to the business meeting** - The business meeting where the new officers are

ected often will only allow you to vote if you are present. Make sure to arrive at least 30 minutes early so you will be prepared.

5. **Bring a cell phone charger** - At the national TSA conference and in some states voting occurs via cell phone. Your cell phone should be fully charged before you enter the business meeting and ready to last through the meeting. You may also want to eat a snack before you enter the business meeting as it may last a couple of hours.
6. **Stay informed** - Time to brush up on your parliamentary procedure. If you are unfamiliar with parliamentary procedure, you should familiarize yourself with some of the basic elements. If you ever have a question at the business meeting you can always request information at any time by being recognized and saying "Request for information" and then stating your question.

I hope everyone will make an informed decision and will convey your concerns to your voting delegates. Always know that you have a voice in TSA. Best of luck in all your events and best of luck to all candidates.

The following proposed bylaw amendment will be voted on at the upcoming 2016 national TSA conference in Nashville, TN, on July 1st:

### **Amendment 1**

*To amend Section 1 -*

Strike the words "live in a" from the motto and replace them with the words "lead the".

*Current wording:*

"The motto of the Technology Student Association will be:  
'Learning to live in a technical world.'"

*If adopted, wording would be:*

"The motto of the Technology Student Association will be:  
'Learning to lead the technical world.'"
